

Tip of the Month Managing Your Dogs Environment

Management is what we do constantly when we have an unbalanced dog or a dog that is nervous, scared or otherwise less than confident when approaching the world. Management is a great tool to use while your dog is learning new behaviors and something that you will use throughout their lifetimes whenever a new or scary situation presents itself.

Management is ensuring your dog (and his/her environment) is safe. It's managing the environment to be sure your dog has a safe place to go or a safe zone. For example, I am often around a lot of dogs. I have one dog who doesn't do well with a lot of dogs around. So anytime that happens and we're close to my truck, I open my

Trouble With Your Pup? Basic Manners Classes

LPCHS hosts weekly classes to assist you with animal communication and excel with your dog. pranaDOGS manners classes are set up as drop-in classes, so you can come anytime your schedule permits....or when your dogs behavior demands it.

Level 1: Covers basic impulse control,

communication and cue's. This is a great place for dogs to have to focus on their family....with other dogs extremely close to them. Kids are always welcome!

Level 2: Practices basic behaviors in an advanced format. Work on staying and coming from 20' away with other dogs present, leash manners and advanced impulse control. Level 2 provides everything needed for a good mannered dog and often the class alumni return to when they want to do a little extra training with their pup.

1st class is always free, then 25/per class or 120 for 6 weeks.



The More You Know Are Essential Oils Dangerous to Pets?

Essential oils have long been used for maladies such as nasal congestion, anxiety, sore muscles and more. And with the popularity of oil diffusers - an easy way to release oils into the air - there is more alarm about how oils may affect animals. Here's what you need to know, straight from the <u>ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center</u>, to give your clients the straight scoop and debunk any misinformation.



Q: What are essential oils and how are they often used?

Essential oils are the natural aromatic compounds that give plants their individual scents. The oils are extracted from plants and distilled, and their potential uses and touted health benefits are wide-ranging. They can be used to make your house smell better, repel mosquitoes, improve sleep, boost moods or even help alleviate nausea. For pets, they are most commonly used for repelling fleas and helping with separation anxiety. Due to their hydrophobic nature, essential oils are absorbed well both through mucous membranes and the skin. There are either excreted unchanged or may be metabolized by the liver prior to excretion.

Q: Are essential oils toxic?

The answer, as we so often see, is slightly more complicated than a simple "yes" or "no" since there are various factors that come into play. First, there is variability with the toxicities of different oil types. Second, the oils can be found in a wide range of concentrations. Products containing essential oils-such as fragrances, shampoos and medicinal products-often contain from 1-20% essential oils. However, there has been an increase in popularity of more concentrated essential oils, some going as high as 100%.

An important third factor is species sensitivity. For example:

- Cats may be more sensitive with dermal exposure due to their increased risk of oral exposure from grooming
- The same concerns apply to pets such as rabbits, guinea pigs and hamsters
- Birds are more likely to suffer respiratory affects than other animals to a diffuser due to their specialized respiratory system

Of course, animals with underlying health issues may also be at higher risk if they are unable to metabolize the oil, have respiratory disorders, or have broken skin which can allow increased absorption of dermally applied essential oils. <u>Learn More...</u>
